

Compton Archery at the Battle of Basing!



Leon and Stuart represented Compton archery at the 'Battle of Basing' Southern Counties Indoor Championships on Sunday 24th February. This is a massive event with almost 200 archers spread across 50 targets shooting two rounds over the course of a day; a WA25 (60 arrows @ 25m into a 60cm tri-spot face) and a WA18 (60 arrows @ 18m into a 40cm tri-spot face).

They both shot very well with Leon achieving a new PB for a WA25 round and both finished around mid-table which is quite an achievement after throwing themselves in at the deep end!



They also formed part of the County of Oxfordshire Archery Society (COAS) group of clubs who were very successful with Silver medals for David Timmins in Gents Recurve, Liana Perry in Junior Lady Compound, Bronze medals for Charlie Birch in Lady Recurve and Kat Baier in Lady Compound! The recurve team of Timmins, Charlie, Howard Moore and Eleonore Cossade finished third overall.

Moving from BareBow to Freestyle (using a sight!)

Most archers start with a club bow in barebow format, i.e. no sight, no stabilisers, no plunger button, just the bow and arrows. This is commonplace for new archers as it allows archers to concentrate on basic form and technique without having to make complex equipment choices as they learn the basics.

Some archers will choose to stay shooting barebow for their entire archery career and there is absolutely nothing wrong with this! Indeed, for activities like field archery, barebow is arguably more common.

But for target archery, it is common to move to a 'freestyle' setup which includes a sight, stabilisers, plunger button, finger tab and a move to an under chin 'Mediterranean' grip and anchor point.

You don't actually need to buy all this equipment in one go. You might buy single pieces at a time and learn to use them one by one. Alternatively you might want to make the leap in one go. Either is fine.

The obvious first step is a sight. Almost every riser has bolt positions for a sight, even the wooden club bows. Sights come in all shapes and sizes and are priced from £5 to £250, but they all essentially do the same thing; they offer a standard sight picture reference point for you to align to the target. You will start aligning the sight pin on the middle of the target, firing an arrow (or better a small group of arrows!) and then adjusting the sight so that the arrows start hitting where the sight pin is pointed! It sounds so easy! However! a sight will not make you a better archer and won't necessarily make it easier either! Ultimately archery comes down to your form and technique and a sight won't help with either of these! This is especially true for juniors who often think in terms of computer games whereby a sight is an instant and constantly accurate aiming device that requires no thought. Archery is not like this!

You pretty much get what you pay for with a sight and more expensive ones will be better made, more easily adjustable and less prone to vibrating loose (which is constant problem with anything screwed to your bow!). For adult archers ideally look around the £50+ price point as that's generally a good 'bang for your buck' and will probably last you well. For juniors who are just starting out, using lighter limbs and likely to go through a number of substantial upgrades, they might be better served with a cheaper sight around £20-£40. Check for sights which are left or right handed and make sure you buy the right one. Also check that it's a recurve sight and not a compound sight as these do differ and compound sights are often not allowed in recurve competitions even though they do fit on the bow! The actual sight pin (the bit you aim) is replaceable with all manner of different shapes and styles so don't worry too much about which one the sight comes with as you can change that later if required. As with all archery equipment there is a pretty good 2nd hand market available with the likes of Ebay etc. Ask Rick or Leon if you're looking in that area.

A number of archers have spare kit for sale as a result of upgrades etc. Before you buy something new it's always worth having a word with Rick or Leon about potential 2nd hand kit available.

Of particular note is:

- Junior 58" wooden club style riser with a choice of 18 or 22lb limbs, with string and arrow rest included for £25. Previously used by a Junior who has since upgraded to a metal riser.
- 11 x Easton Jazz xx75 1816 arrows 30" but can be easily cut to any size. £40
- SF Axiom Sight with sight pin. £10

We are hoping that all of our AGB members will sign-up, regardless of experience. It should be a great event!

We're in the process of introducing the Archery GB 'Feathers' and 'Arrow' award system which are awarded to archers who have demonstrated various archery shooting skills and general knowledge. It's another good progression system that focuses on knowledge of the sport and not just scores. Keep an eye out for more information on that.
